

Coming Later This Year

The bridge spanning Loyalsock Creek, which provides access to the cabin colony at the park (pictured above and to the right) will be undergoing a full superstructure replacement in late 2024. As a result, reservations for the cabin colony and group tenting sites at the Park will be unavailable during October and November of 2024.

The closure of Cabin Bridge Road will also result in the rerouting of the Loyalsock Trail. Affected hikers should contact the park for more information. The park campground, located along Route 154, will not be impacted and will be open for its normal operating season dates.



FIREWOOD AVAILABLE THIS SUMMER:

Firewood is available for sale in the cabin area and campground this summer - \$8.00 per bundle. Look for the self-serve kiosk near the trash dumpsters on the right as you enter the cabin area and near the two shower houses in the campground. Money from these sales funds the park improvement projects of the Friends of Worlds End State Park.

DON'T FORGET THE KINDLING OR FIRESTARTER STICKS!

Campers sometimes forget that it takes more than just the firewood to get a good fire going. Don't forget to bring dry small branches and twigs—you can sometimes scavenge around your campsite to find some—but sometimes the camping area is picked pretty clean. You can also buy commercial firestarter sticks or bricks at most home, outdoors, or grocery stores.

The dashboard was designed for Pennsylvanians to use themselves, so they can see where ticks are prevalent and be prepared to take appropriate precautions while enjoying outdoor activities. The dashboard allows visitors the opportunity to review the latest state data on tickborne disease activity, such as Lyme disease and also information on how to prevent tick bites.



ountain Laurel (*Kalmia latifolia*) blooms in June covering the northern mountains of the Commonwealth with its 5-sided white and pink blooms. This evergreen was chosen by Governor Gifford Pinchot in May 1933 as the official state flower. Mountain laurel varies from four to ten feet in height and is commonly found growing on rocky mountaintops. Its leaves are lance-shaped, glossy and dark green in color, three to four inches long, and are leather-like in texture. Being evergreen, its leaves do not fall to the ground during the winter months.










Mountain Laurel can be found at Worlds End in several locations.

On the left: While more often found on ridge and mountain tops, it can be found in other areas, such as the picnic area near the Cliff Pavilion.

On the right: A bush of Mountain Laurel clings to the top of the cliff across the creek from the park's picnic area.

Mountain Laurel can be found in these other state parks and forests across Pennsylvania:

- Along the road leading to the High Knob Overlook in the Loyalsock State Forest.
- Along the Laurel View trail at Ricketts Glen State Park.
- Along the Quehanna Highway in the Moshannon and Elk State Forests in Clearfield, Elk and Cameron counties.
- Colton Point State Park in Tioga County.



- Along Ridge Road in the Elk State Forest in Cameron and Potter counties.
- Along Route 144 in the Sproul State Forest in Centre and Clinton counties.
- Along Route 44 in the Tioga, Tiadaghton, and Susquehannock State Forests in Lycoming,



s the Mountain Laurel fades, in early July another evergreen, the Rhododendron, takes over. However, unlike the Mountain Laurel, Rhododendron shuns the sunny mountain and ridge tops and instead prefers the shade found in deep hollows and the north sides of mountains. The blooms are white to various shades of light pink, with broad, flat green leaves.

Dames Rocket (above) blooms in shades of white to deep purple in mid-May through early June along hillsides and embankments. It has four petals, and is often confused with wild Phlox, which has five petals.

Day Lillys (right) bloom throughout summer, especially later in the summer.

Bee Balm (below) with their square stems, blooms later in the summer and prefers wet areas.

"OH, WOW!" The first thing that grabs a visitor's attention upon entering the education room in the park's visitors center is the taxidermy. education room in the park's visitors center is the taxidermy

displayed throughout. Both young and old have a chance to see and learn about wildlife that they may rarely, if at all, observe in the wild. Over the years, many of these taxidermy specimens were generously donated to the park by Nancy Craft, owner and operator of Rock Run Taxidermy. Nancy was a teacher, taxidermist, and conservationist who devoted much of her lifetime to the youth of our community. She was a certified shooting coach and taught hunter safety education for many



years. She gave many wildlife presentations in our campground amphitheater.

Nancy would be pleased to know that her grandson, Ethan Craft, is employed as a maintenance repairman here at Worlds End (photo on left). Ethan certainly takes pride in his grandmother's work and in her legacy.

If you have stayed recently in one of the park cabins, you may recognize this not-terribly-shy red squirrel who stalks the cabin colony! Red squirrels are typically smaller than their cousin, the more common grey squirrel, and are generally considered more aggressive than the greys. Another difference are the tufts of hair on the ears of the red squirrel—as seen on the picture above left.




BECOME A DCNR CONSERVATION VOLUNTEER:


