


To conserve, support and protect the park's resources by promoting education, recreation, and stewardship.

Forest of the Year: Loyalsock State Forest

At the annual Pennsylvania Parks and Forests
Foundation (PPFF) awards banquet on May 13 at
Little Buffalo State Park, The Loyalsock Forest
District was named State Forest of the Year!
District Forester Rich Glinski and Service
Forester Sean Freidhof (pictured on the left with
PPFF President Marci Mowery) accepted the
award on behalf of the Forest. The
Loyalsock was chosen from the twenty forest
districts in the Commonwealth for its
recreational opportunities, sound management
of forest resources, and the staff's resiliency in
contending with numerous catastrophic
weather events over the past 15 years.

PA Parks and Forests Foundation Annual Awards:

Cliff Jones Keystone Legacy Award: Lewis Lumber Co./Dwight Lewis Lumber

Also at the awards banquet, the Cliff Jones Keystone Legacy Award went to the Lewis Lumber Company/ Dwight Lewis Lumber. Accepting the award were Friends of Worlds End Marc and Mel Lewis (pictured on the right). A part of Sullivan County since 1942, Lewis Lumber was honored for their dedication to forest stewardship and sustainable timber harvesting, and their commitment to protecting Pennsylvania's natural resources. The company's practices are guided by trained foresters to protect watersheds, ensure regeneration, and maintain biodiversity. Lewis Lumber uses 100% of its wood residues; using them as animal bedding for local farms and for use at Worlds End State Park's campground (if you have ever pitched a tent at the campground, it is mulch from Lewis Lumber that you set your tent up on). The company minimizes its environmental footprint by recycling, cutting energy usage with efficient lighting and heating systems, and upgrading its fleet for lower emissions.











Upgrades to the Park's Office and Visitor Center:



over the winter, the park's talented maintenance staff made numerous enhancements to the park's office and visitor's center (picture on the left). A new park merchandise kiosk was created to more prominently display the shirts, mugs, bandannas, hats, etc. that the park sells. The "CAMP 95 TRADING POST" sign is a reference to the 1930's Civilian Conservation Corps (CCC) camp that built the park.

Also added to the visitor's center was new cabinetry to store and display park artifacts, including much of the park's cherished taxidermy collection (see pictured below). The cabinets were crafted from cherry wood, coming from a cherry tree that had fallen in the park.

The next time you visit the park, make sure to check out these beautiful new additions to the visitor's center—and pick up a souvenir!





ARCHERY CLASSES THIS SUMMER:




Forests for All: DCNR Unveils New Plan to Connect People to Pennsylvania's Forests and More Outdoor Recreation Opportunities:


The plan focuses on three key areas:


- 1. Strengthening the Bureau of Forestry's Resource Management Foundations Ensuring forests remain healthy and productive for generations to come.

FIREWOOD AVAILABLE THIS SUMMER:

Firewood is available for sale in the cabin area and campground this spring - \$8.00 per bundle. Look for the self-serve kiosk near the trash dumpsters on the right as you enter the cabin area and near the shower houses in the campground. Money from these sales funds the park improvement projects of the Friends of Worlds End State Park.

DON'T FORGET THE KINDLING OR FIRESTARTER STICKS!

Campers sometimes forget that it takes more than just the firewood to get a good fire going. Don't forget to bring dry small branches and twigs—you can sometimes scavenge around your campsite to find some—but sometimes the camping area is picked pretty clean. You can also buy commercial firestarter sticks or bricks at most home, outdoors, or grocery stores.






CABINS AND BRIDGE CLOSURE THIS AUTUMN:

The bridge spanning Loyalsock Creek on Cabin Bridge Road, which provides access to the cabin colony at the park, will be undergoing a full superstructure



replacement throughout October and November of 2025. As a result, reservations for the cabin colony and group tenting sites at the Park will be unavailable during October and November of 2025. The closure of Cabin Bridge Road will also result in the rerouting of the Loyalsock Trail. Affected hikers should contact the park for more information. The park campground, located along Route 154, will not be impacted and will be open for its normal operating season dates. 

WHAT IS YOUR FAVORITE MONTH FOR HIKING?

Recent survey results released by the Pennsylvania Parks and Forests Foundation indicates that autumn is the favorite time of year for hiking.



TRAIL NOTES:

Hikers of the Loyalsock Trail should be aware of a recent rerouting of the trail near Angels Falls—the tallest waterfall in the Endless Mountains (pictured on right). This past April, the Alpine Club of Williamsport rerouted the trail to take hikers more directly along Falls Run and the waterfalls along this stream. The new route has been blazed with traditional LT blazes (pictured below on the left). The "old trail" is still in place and can be used to create a "loop" to take you back down the mountain after you have hiked to the top of Angels Falls. This old route will soon be blazed as a link trail.



The Loyalsock Trail is displayed in yellow on the map on the right. The rerouted trail takes you closer to and up Falls Run—see the pink dots on the map.



Forestry staff has recently installed signs where the LINK TRAIL crosses forestry roads—seen here on the left is where the LINK TRAIL crosses COLD RUN ROAD at mile 3.72.



THE SEVEN DEADLY SWIMS


While a refreshing swim on a hot day adds to summer fun, time in the water can also end in tragedy.

Be safe in the water by avoiding the deadly swims outlined below.



Swimming outside a designated swimming area

Jumping into unknown or fast moving waters

Swimming without a life jacket and/ or in an area/depth beyond your ability





Swimming under the influence of drugs or alcohol
